

St Luke's congregations, I should like to thank our wonderful bell ringers for their weekly commitment, time and energy to ensure that our bells ring out to welcome one and all to St Luke's Church. We are so blessed and privileged to have such a great team of campanologists and there isn't often the opportunity to pass on our thanks publicly. On Armistice Day I could hear the bells ringing from my back garden; I hope many others heard them too and, who knows, they may even gain some new recruits!



Ringing Remembers - On Sunday 11th November, the 100th anniversary of The Armistice which ended the First World War, the bells of St Luke's rang out just after mid-day along with the bells of nearly all the Churches in England. Back in 1918 the bells were rung to announce and celebrate the return of peace. This year the bells were rung in celebration of the anniversary at the suggestion of the Government and co-ordinated by The Central **Council of Church Bell Ringers. The Central Council took** the opportunity of announcing an initiative to recruit 1400 new ringers throughout the country to replace and honour the 1400 ringers who lost their lives during The Great War. Countrywide the initiative has proved to be very successful, over 2000 new recruits signing up to learn to ring. Remembrance Sunday

This year our November Service of Remembrance was even more poignant as we 'celebrated' 100 years since the end of World War 1 in 1918. Some 65 million men were in action across Europe during World War 1. Nearly a third of them – some 21 million – were wounded. Another 8.5 million were killed and some 7.7 million were taken prisoners of war.



All of them had family and friends whose lives were changed forever by the events of 1914-1918. How sobering is that?

This year, during our service, three wreaths were processed to the altar. Our Rose Queen Sophie Pitt, represented our church children, Dorothy Humphreys represented not only our church congregation but also all Women who served in that war and continue to serve today, standing bravely alongside the men. Our third wreath was new, handmade by Audrey Davies, this was presented by Cara Evans who represented the children of our Sunday School and also the pupils of Farnworth CE School.



Treasurer's Report, General Fund period Jan- Oct 2018 Receipts £86,060.12 Expenses £105,001.69 = Deficit £18.941.57 Deficit average £1.900 per month Bank Account Balances @ 30th October 2018 Current a/c £10,041.63 Reserve a/c £30,927.23 Friends Total £42095.20 a/c £1,126.34 Allocated to:-Restricted Funds £33,426.72 Designated Funds £8,009.86 General Fund £658.62 O/D As you can see the general fund is overdrawn by £658.62. we are due funds in from Gift aid for this and earlier years and after paying outstanding creditors we will have £10,000 to add to general funds. However that money will not last very long, only about 6 months. We urgently need to act now to reduce this deficit. We can do very little about reducing the expenditure, in fact in the new year we will have to start paying bank charges of around £70 per month because as our income is over £100,000 per year, we no longer qualify for free banking. A total of 300 magazines are printed every two months, and I am asking you, ONLY IF YOU ARE ABLE, every time you receive a magazine to make a donation of £10. If everyone does this, we would have additional donations every two months of £3,000 x 6 issues a year = £18.000. This would make a HUGE difference to reducing the deficit. A little from everyone helps spread the load. A big thank you to everyone who has increased their planned giving this year, every bit helps to keep the deficit down. 


