#### Fabric Report

Hopefully you will all have enjoyed your Christmas frivolities and returned to normality, whatever that is. As we reported in our last letter, the Saxon Cross was all but destroyed but thankfully can be repaired. As previously said, the interest and support for the repair has been very rewarding, not only in good wishes but in generous donations, and we are very grateful for this response. Here are a few photographs of the cross making its journey to the workshop to be renewed.











The accident has enabled us to look into the early history surrounding this cross and asks the question, is the church older than we realise? When the crash happened it unearthed a date on the base of the top of the cross with the figures 1,000. This suggests that an early church may have been in existence and not the one that history states as being formed in 1180. Watch this space for more revelations.

We had a very constructive meeting with



Halton Borough Council (HBC) regarding our grant application for toilets in the base of the tower. Toilets are essential if the church is to progress and be a growing part of the community it serves. We have had plans passed and are well on the way to reaching the matched funding figure we need for the grant support.

We have been asked to provide evidence that toilets are a necessity in the church by means of a questionnaire, which will indicate the dire need for this facility. We would ask you to please take part in this request and prove that the toilets and kitchenette are necessary additions to church life.

#### Treasurer's Report, 01/01/23 to 31/12/23

The Adjustment to Receipts is for monies owed to the PCC regarding Bold Mission, the Diocese is aware of this, Apparently the person who dealt with it in the past has moved on to another department.

The total Parish share due by St Luke's for 2023 has been reduced from £84,245 to £72,245 per year. The reduction is very welcome, but unfortunately we are still unable to pay it in full. The initial surplus before creditors of £28,433 has been used to pay the outstanding parish share from 2022 of £26,000. By the end of December 2023, a further £16,000 has been paid to the Diocese, towards the 2023 Parish share, leaving £56,245 outstanding to them. Sadly, quite a few of our regular givers have passed away in 2023, and this has had a remarked effect on contributions to the general fund in the year. There is a shortfall of £2,150 per month, just to break even. £10,000 a month is required to cover the minimum outgoings on the general fund. In December across all of the various services and schools and other concerts, over 3000 people came through the doors. Receipts amounted to just under £15,000, which was fantastic, it would be amazing to have that amount every month. Included in that figure was £680 collected for the Children's Society from the Christingles, £1,464 towards the repairs to the cross, School concerts £643, other concerts £800+. Honestly, I am worried about the future of St Luke's church, like any business, if we are unable to pay our minimum overheads, changes will have to be made. As advised by the Diocese we are paying our minimum overheads and the only creditor is the Diocese themselves. However the Parish Share needs to be paid to cover clergy costs. When you read this magazine, can you please give some thought as to how you personally, can help, if every one of us made a small donation each month of just £5, times 300 that would be £18,000 extra income in the year, donating £10 would double that amount. Spread the word to family, friends and neighbours please. This is an extract from a letter sent by Bishop John to all clergy, Lay Ministers and Wardens in the Diocese of Liverpool.

Dear friends,

A Happy New Year to all.

"As Christians we watch the years pass not with nostalgia or sentimentality but with the joy of those moving forward to an encounter with true



life" (Oscar Romero). May we be able to fill the year ahead with peace and love. I pray for you and your community as you seek to work humbly for God in whatever way you are called to serve. As you do so I would like to encourage you to consider how the bible will feature in your thoughts during this year. It may seem strange for a bishop to be saying this to a Christian community.

Yet as I have spoken before this is a longstanding concern of mine. That Christians have lost the knowledge of God's great story as written in the sixty-six books that make up our bible. We must reclaim that story and see it as our story. And we must be confident in telling it. Young and old, lay and clergy, we must be confident in the story and be able to show how our story fits into God's great story. I don't want this to be a fad or an initiative. I want us to consciously weave our understanding of the bible and biblical study into all that we do over the next and future years. We have the rule of life where we are encouraged to pray, read and learn and I would ask you think about how you use this discipline to reengage with your bible, to maybe delve into places that you haven't visited for a while. You will find great joy in the exploration. Our rule of life challenges us to continue to place scripture at the heart of what we are doing.

Some of you may choose to read the whole Bible in this year. Some may want to read the books in the Bible you are not familiar with. Some may want to re-read the familiar parts of the Bible with fresh eyes and ears. 'Disciple' means 'student.' We are all called to be learners as disciples of Christ. Let's make 2024 a year where we consciously read, engage with, and study the Bible in every possible context, making a commitment to learn our own story in Christ and to share it confidently. +John



Suggestions for Bible reading In the New Testaments books of Romans, Corinthians 1 & 2, Galatians, Ephesians and Philippians, we can read God's message for Christians in the

early Church. Each of these books is packed full of practical encouragement and advice for any follower of Jesus; the words are still relevant for us today.

Any of these books would be a good place to start delving deeper into the Bible. If you would like to take one of our Church Bibles to study at home you would be very welcome; please just ask a Warden. Sue

Our January meeting was led by Chris and she started with prayers. We had a minute's silence for the loss of Barry Ingram, Wendy Collinson and June Fay. Our speaker was Clare Liptrott, a reader at St Luke's as well as being involved in other areas. Clare started by reading Matthew 28 19-20, to go forward doing God's work and He promises He will stay with us forever. Over to Clare. It was a privilege to be invited to speak at the January MU meeting and I thought a lot about what topic, in the end I spoke about my life with a particular focus on how my faith shaped my journey. From a young age I went to Sunday School with my friends and then as we got older myself and 2 friends decided to be 'rebels' and rather than go to Sunday School we decided we'd sneak into church instead! So for a couple of years, we went to the main Sunday service at St Andrew's Church in Maghull, unbeknownst to our parents - what rebels we were! We all got confirmed and continued to grow up together, attending church and also a Christian youth club.

My school life didn't go quite as planned and I ended up leaving halfway through my A-levels and by sheer chance got an apprenticeship in a pharmacy, after I had studied for a B-Tec in pharmacy, I got married to Steve and then went off to Manchester University to study for a pharmacy degree (never one to do things the traditional way round!) My parents moved to Widnes and after finishing university and qualifying as a pharmacist Steve and I also moved to Widnes. Not long after settling here we were excited to find ourselves pregnant, it was a very traumatic pregnancy but, thank the Lord, it all turned out well in the end. I was always very close to my mum and dad and sadly, when Oliver was still young, my dad developed cancer, a brain tumour, and although he fought valiantly it was not treatable and he passed away. It was at this point I met Rev'd Helen Morby, vicar at St Luke's Church at that time, she supported our family through the sad time of dad's passing and I began to attend St Luke's Church regularly.

As Oliver continued to grow up, we thought about having another child but it was a hard decision due to the health issues during my first pregnancy, but God guided me and we went on to have Sophie. Sophie was 7 days old the first time she went to St Luke's church and she attended regularly with me whilst she was young, just as Oliver had done too; both my children went to Sunday School at St Luke's and were part of the Rose Queen retinue, with Sophie being Rose Queen herself one year. I became a member of PCC and for a time was also a Church Warden, then one day Rev'd Helen asked me if I had ever thought about my calling, did I think I might be called by God. The answer to this was "yes", I had been feeling 'the call', like a gentle tap on my shoulder, for a while, but I had been ignoring it. It seemed that the time had come to admit to it and so, I began a journey of discernment that was to have many ups and downs, twists and turns, which would ultimately led me to study to become a Lay Reader Minister.

And that is as far as my story got with the ladies from MU, my time was up, and the tea and biscuits were ready to be served,


although I did promise to come back and share with them 'part 2' at some point in the near future. Why was it important to share my story? Well, I think this was because the journey that something or someone has been on, how they were made and crafted, their experiences, their knocks and bumps, moments of sadness and happiness make them who or what they are. #### **AIR CADETS**

Some of you may know that I am the Chaplain for the 310 Widnes Air Training Corps and I went along to lead my Christmas 'Padre's Hour'. I thought you'd like to hear about what we got up to. We started with a Christmas Ice Breaker - creating our own 'elf names' -mine was 'Caramel Elftrott'.

Of course, my plan was to tell the nativity story BUT I wanted to have a different take on things, to change it up a little, as many young people get the nativity story over and over in school at this time of year and I imagine it is easy for them to 'switch off'. So, my focus was on angels. The cadets listened to passage from Luke's Gospel (birth of Jesus and then shepherds and angels). The cadets were asked to imagine what the scenes would be like and to identify key points / words / images that stood out for them. I expected to have to guide them to think about the angels and how they terrified the shepherds but they identified this themselves! Then I read a passage from the Quran about the angel coming to Mary (did you know that the Quran has more writing about the Virgin Mary than the Christian Bible?) It is important in my role as Chaplain that I am sensitive to the fact that there may be other faiths represented within the squadron.

In Ezekiel 10 **the cherub** is depicted as having two pairs of wings, and four faces: that of a lion (representative of all wild animals), an ox (domestic animals), a human (humanity), and an eagle (birds).

We then moved on to a Christmas Quiz and the final question was to draw what they thought angels looked like. After getting the answers to the quiz we looked at their drawings of angels in more detail and at images I had printed of 'traditional' angels and 'biblically accurate' angels. We then moved on to think about who / what angels are and their link to God. This led to an amazing discussion that all the cadets participated in and allowed me to share the good news.

We finished with a light-hearted game of pass the parcel with forfeits and chocolate coins in each layer. Interestingly a few cadets had never played pass the parcel before, so it was good to share and teach them a new game!

#### TRIBUTE TO BARRY INGRAM

As a Church family we were so saddened to hear that our dear friend Barry Ingram had passed away. I was privileged to be asked to officiate at this funeral service and as expected, many people came to pay their respects, he had touched so many lives. His nephew Kevin shared some very personal stories with us about his relationship with his Uncle Barry who was like a Dad to him. This is just an excerpt from my Tribute. Barry was born on the 17<sup>th</sup> August 1939 to parents Harry and Doris Ingram at 286, Upton Lane, the house he has called home ever



since. From the age of 5 he attended Farnworth Infant school, before transferring into the Junior school which was in an entirely different building in those days.

When he was 11, he passed the scholarship and went to Wade Deacon Grammar School for Boys, and he really enjoyed his studies and flourished there. On leaving Wade Deacon, he took up an apprenticeship with British Rail where he worked for 40 years, retiring at the age of 56.

It was whilst he was working for British Rail in the Warrington Goods Yard, that he received his call up papers to do his National Service, apparently he and his friend John, were among the last to be called up. He was drafted into the Dental Corps where he was trained to be dental nurse and technician. He was sent out to Berlin and to Spandau...just the very name of that place sends shivers down my spine, bringing terrible scenes to my mind.

Barry had the dubious 'privilege', if you could call it that, of assisting the Army dentist when he attended to Rudolph Hess. Bryan explained that Bary was actually exempted from the last 6 months of his tour of duty in Germany, due to the stress of working in Spandau, this was the case for all those served there.....we really can't imagine how dreadful that time must have been for them all.. Barry retired from the Railways at the age of 56, but he then worked for GUS, as a Security Guard. It ended up being a bit more than a temporary job, he worked for about a further 10 years. But retirement wasn't really an option for Barry because he had plenty of hobbies. He loved being outdoors in the fresh air and he walked miles, usually with a dog, apparently he loved Snooker and was very good at it. He enjoyed his garden, especially his roses, and always had a vase fresh flowers in the house.. Holidays were important to him, a special time to relax and visit new destinations and goodness me, he had travelled extensively and visited some amazing places sometimes on escorted tours.

I knew that he loved his time in Russia with all its gilded architecture, we shared stories about Canada, other places he had visited were New Zealand, Peru and Madeira and Tenerife, where he thoroughly enjoyed walking in the hills and visiting the beautiful formal gardens and where his love of photography would be put to good use. Closer to home, he loved the Lake District which was always a stop off point on his way to Arran, a place he must have walked every inch of, he and Robert were such frequent visitors there and Barry always came back totally refreshed.

And then of course, there is the Barry who we all know from church. He was very proud of the fact that he and his brothers were choir boys from a very young age, and Robert showed me a small, but very beautiful, silver framed, black and white photograph of the three angelic looking brothers in their choir cassocks and surplices; and up until quite recently, Barry would step in and sing in the choir for major festivals and other services....perhaps the choir is where his love of music originally came from, because he really enjoyed going to live concerts, many of which were in the Bridgewater Hall and he loved live theatre, sometimes at the Lowry in Manchester. From those early beginnings, his involvement with St Luke's has just grown and grown. A member of our Parish Council, he acted as Lay Chair and was a no-nonsense chair; he served on the Team Council. He was a Warden and sidesperson for many, many years. He did the weekly count of money and banked it. He was so meticulous, never a penny out! As our Gift Aid Secretary he spent hours and hours on the wording for Giving in Grace Initiative; he was absolutely determined that the letters should strike the right note. With a Bishop's licence to administer Communion, he visited people in their homes, this was hugely appreciated by those he visited. Cronton School valued his support as a School Governor and member of their Council and he is sorely missed there.

He instigated and organised our Wednesday Open Church sessions, a key requirement of our English Heritage funding. He played his part on Heritage Day, giving tours and proudly speaking about the church he had known all his life. He loved to come to this lectern to either read Bible passages or to lead Intercessions which he meticulously wrote out by hand. He was first to sign up for Lent courses and contributed to Bible studies and Meditation.

The King James' Bible was his preferred Version of the Bible BUT he was very forward thinking, and open to change. He totally understood and accepted the need to move with the times and try new forms of worship and services which he embraced.

Do you get the impression that his life was steeped in faith? He was a man of strong principles all of which were underpinned by his beliefs and his love of God. People sought him out to give his opinion.... he was never, ever a front man... just always, always there in the background, quietly, faithfully working away, there whenever you needed him, just always there, ready and willing to help and support whenever and wherever he could.

And over the years we all needed him and his measured words of wise counsel and we have missed him so much recently. It was good that he was able to make it to church when we acknowledged and celebrated his amazing, selfless service to St Luke's and his church family...I know that he very much appreciated the welcome and the gifts that he received that day.

FOR ME PERSONALLY, I have so much for which to thank him. There are some words that I have purposely not used so far, true gentleman, strong principles, thoughtful, sincere, caring, prayerful, his faith steeped in the Gospel, proud of his roots, great intellect, always so smart, suit, collar and tie and ALWAYS shoes that were polished until they shone...we have so much to celebrate about the way in which Barry Ingram conducted himself and lived his life. Barry's faith was unerring; he put his trust in God to guide him through all things, knowing that he would provide for him. And so today, we very much thank God for Barry Ingram, a true gentleman, a soul mate, a wonderful brother, an amazing uncle and a very dear friend to so very many.

As a church family, we send our deepest condolences to Robert, to Margaret and Kevin and his brothers Denis, Bryan and their families. God bless you Barry, a true and faithful servant, you **so** deserve the rest and peace you will now know. *Sue*


