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Dear Friends,

Many of the lessons I have learned about God, and indeed about life, have been taught to me by children. As the government restrictions begin to lift some of us are planning a desperately needed holiday break and I would like to share with you a lesson you may even see acted out if you are fortunate enough to be holidaying on a beach this year (socially distanced of course!).

I know I'm not the first or only person who has seen it but there is a lesson in it that we may have overlooked. Picture the scene, there are some children on a beach. They're playing and giggling as they build sandcastles. They seem so intent on the project. It is funny for grownups to see how meticulous and careful they are with crumbly corners and towers. The looks on their faces make you smile. Their concentration on the task is priceless. Then a big wave begins building and starts toward the shore. But the children don't panic. Instead, they do the strangest thing. They jump to their feet, scream with delight, and watch the torrent of water wash away their creations. There is no panic. No sadness. No bitterness. Even children know the inevitable end of sandcastles. They are neither surprised nor angry about what has happened.

You and I should be so wise. The stuff of this world is about as lasting and durable as children's sandcastles on the beach. Yet we grownups can get so caught up in it, defensive of it, and depressed over the loss of it. But God didn't create us to be famous, get rich, live in the biggest house, or drive the fanciest car.

He created us for his glory. He put us in the world to love people and do holy things. Our destiny is not bound up in physical things, but spiritual. So, living to be a hundred is far less important than living well, even if turns out to be for what we consider to be a short time. We already know deep down that beautifying our bodies is far less urgent than purifying our souls.

Children know that their sandcastles are brief joys destined to disappear with an incoming tide. So, they don't fret as the waves approach. They watch their creations get swept away without shedding tears. Again, we should be so wise. Everything about this life is fleeting and perishable. The incoming wave of human mortality is going to sweep it all away. Like sandcastles, nothing done for the sake of this world can last. Only what we do for eternity will survive.

What would the loss of your job or business do to you? (Two members of my own family so far have lost their jobs because of the economic crisis caused by the pandemic). What if your house was lost to fire or storm? What if a strange pain sent you to your G.P. and led to bad news? These things really happen. We are all as vulnerable as sandcastles.

It's not my intention to be morbid or to cause rampant depression throughout the parish! But just a little reminder that life and all the good it contains is God's gift. We should revel in every good thing he has blessed us with. But as we enjoy our creations in the sand, just remember not to get overly attached to them.

PUBLIC WORSHIP

Most of you will know by now that following permission from our bishops and national government we, like many other churches, resumed public worship at St Luke on 19th July. It was a decision not taken lightly but only after detailed discussion and a careful risk assessment to make gathering in church as safe as possible.

The PCC and I have presently agreed to offer just one service each Sunday at 10.30am, which will enable us to accept funerals on Wednesdays or Thursdays whilst allowing for the recommended minimum 72hrs gap in-between.

This service and also the usual one each Wednesday at 9.30am will continue to be livestreamed via zoom for those in a vulnerable category, or simply not ready yet. I want to emphasise that if you are in one of these categories, including being over 70, then you should think carefully before attending. Of course, everyone will be welcome and no-one turned away but the choice (and potential risk) is yours alone.

If you decide to come then you will find that church services are currently very different from what you are used to.

For example:

The wearing of face masks is advisable but not (yet) compulsory.

You will be required to use the hand sanitiser gel provided on entry and exit.

You will be asked to observe social distancing and sit only in the pews clearly marked.

Singing is not permitted.

A Warden will take a note of your name and telephone number to be kept for 21 days in case

we need to trace anyone in the event that a fellow congregation member becomes ill.

Of course, these are only the first faltering steps in moving out of the 'lockdown' situation of the last few months and, no doubt, guidance will change as time goes on. I would ask you to join me in praying that we might make good decisions that minimise the risk to health by careful attention to detail.



God willing, we will meet in September. Until then have Faith and keep safe. Rita Poole



Tribute to Kath Houghton



Kathleen Houghton was a lovely, calm, gentle, faithful lady.

It says something about Kath and her faith that she chose to have a cross and white lilies, her favourite flowers, on her Order of Service.

Kath died very peacefully on June 4th 2020, after a determined and courageous fight with Non Hodgkinson's Lymphoma. She had been told a little while back that her treatment would have to end and she took that information with such stoicism and dignity.

Her son Chris received lots of messages of sympathy many of which described his mum as a beautiful, calm, gentle lady and to the very end that is just how she was. Kathleen Mary Hill was born on October 11th 1928, one of 8 children, two of whom died in infancy. She chuckled one day as she told me about her early years, about dashing across the open fields near her family home on Birchfield Road, running errands for neighbours. Sometimes she would be given a halfpenny which she thought was a fortune, but mostly she gave that halfpenny to her Mum as money was short and every little bit helped but just occasionally she would treat herself to some sweets which she would share out, that was so typical of Kath's kindness and generosity even at such a young age.

Throughout her life she worked mostly as a shop assistant and she met her husband Fred when she was working at the Coop. They married at St Luke's Church on May 15th 1951 and moved into their first home in Windermere Street, a home that they stayed in for 50 years. They had just the one son Christopher, who was the absolute apple of his mum's eye.

After Fred's death she stayed on in Windermere Street until she moved into her flat in Carmel Court where she had her treasured possessions.

She loved to cook and dine out in restaurants for special meals. Family and friends were important to her and they always received a warm welcome into her home. She enjoyed watching the seasons and colours change in her garden, she fed the birds making up her own mix of porridge oats and dried fruits for them and she spent many an afternoon just relaxing and reading. Kath will be sorely missed especially by her son Chris, her sister Milly and other close family members. We send them our deepest sympathy.



So many of us were blessed to have known Kath's love, support and friendship and we will feel all the poorer for not having her in our lives.



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News from Cronton

Four months in lockdown – what news is there to share? Time has speeded up and it shows in the mirror – who is this person who has moved in with my? It's surely not me looking back at me.





I am working from home and 'see' my colleagues on a screen; it's enough to feel connected.

Matthew – the son of my friend and colleague Rachel, asked her a question this week. His dad was out and the two of them were making lunch... "Was this what it was like before I was born? Just you and my dad during the plague?" It made me

laugh and then it made me wonder – this generation of children are growing up in a unique and abnormal period in history – how does the world appear to them? What do they make of it? How will it shape their lives?

This change in our lives is temporary, although it may never be quite the same as before and that's not a bad thing. It is increasingly difficult for people to behave safely [many are stir crazy] and government advice complicates things. The government have to balance our health and the economy – relaxing the rules is not because it safe to do so. As an NHS employee, we have been asked to make sure family and friends understand that this country is still at Level 4 risk. There will definitely be a second wave – spikes are already appearing and four areas in the north are due to go back

into lockdown. We must still stay home when we can and when we decide to go out and mix with others, social distancing is vital and wearing a mask is an absolute MUST. Hand washing and sanitising is as important as ever. The hairdresser is still a dream - I may be there some time when I eventually get to go! This COVID safety routine is especially important to follow as St Luke's opens again. Do not forget to follow the one way system, social distancing and masks ... and do not be tempted to sing. If you saw a photograph of a petri dish growing the virus spread by the droplets from someone talking or singing you would find this really easy to do. Remember you can be infected through your eyes - wear glasses if you have them. Do not be scared by this advice – just be careful, stay safe.



I will be joining services on Zoom – for safety? Because I have grown out of all my clothes? ... You guessed it – both.

This world of worship in small numbers is not something to see as a wholly bad thing. In Bishop Paul's book 'The Table' [2019], he suggests that

the dynamic Christ enjoyed with his followers is available to us today through the Holy Spirit and it is characterised by face to face contact [virtual by screen or physical contact]. To have meaningful contact at the table with the Holy Spirit, smaller numbers are best so that all can engage – eight is a great number it seems. 'When two, three or more are gathered in his name'. What doesn't work is being alone – as humans we need

the dynamic of other people to learn, develop and grow. He refers to the 'community of the face' - a group at a table small enough for everyone to be seen and known. And I love this extract:

'The Apostles were not snooker balls. But if they had been, they would have been in the right sized group. Twelve is the largest number of snooker balls which can all touch the same central ball at the same time.... In the church... eight to fifteen people is the optimum size for an interactive group. More than fifteen... two groups of eight.'

Bishop Paul [in The Table] reminds us of a common saying - 'you can't pray everywhere all the time, unless you pray somewhere for some of the time. Similarly you can't expect to live the lifestyle of Jesus's group unless your diary contains a time and place for meeting, and your address book contains the people you will meet with there.'

So join church services 'zoom or in person]; and if you want to 'meet' in smaller groups for morning and evening prayer at a distance - give us a shout.

the packing and she is tired - but the move is done. We wish her much happiness in her next adventure.

Let's end with prayer – prayer that acknowledges the worldwide movement to make black lives matter as much as white lives. Lack of experience of systems that treat some of our brothers and sisters as 'less' means we have a responsibility to learn what this means. The 'church' has produced some reflections and prayers to put this right among the Christian family and Bishop Paul has circulated them so please read on... here is one of these. A litany - Rev Dr Yolanda Pierce, Princetown Seminary

Let us not rush to the language of healing, before understanding the fullness of the injury and the depth of the wound.

Let us not rush to offer a bandage, when gaping wounds requires surgery and complete reconstruction. Let us not offer false equivalencies, thereby diminishing the particular pain

being felt in a particular circumstance in a particular historical moment.

Let us not speak of reconciliation without speaking of reparations and restoration, or how we can repair the breach and how we can restore the loss.

Let us not rush past the loss of this mother's child, this father's child...someone's beloved son.

Let us not value property over people;

let us not protect material objects while human lives hang in the balance.

Let us not value a false peace over a righteous justice. Let us not be afraid to sit with the ugliness, messiness, and the pain that is life in community together.

Let us not offer clichés to the grieving, those whose hearts are being torn asunder.

Instead...

Let us mourn men and women killed extrajudicially in the US every 28 hours.

Let us lament the loss of a teenager, dead at the hands of a police officer who described him as a demon. Let us weep at a criminal justice system, which is neither blind nor just.

Let us call for the mourning men and the wailing women, those willing to rend their garments of privilege and ease, and sit in the ashes of this nation's original sin.

Let us be silent when we don't know what to say.

Let us be humble and listen to the pain, rage, and grief pouring from the lips of neighbours and friends.

Let us decrease, so that our brothers and sisters who live on the underside of history may increase.

Let us pray with our eyes open and our feet firmly planted on the ground.

Let us listen to the shattering glass & let us smell the purifying fires, for it is the language of the unheard. God, in your mercy... Show me my own complicity in injustice.

Convict me for my indifference.

Forgive me when I have remained silent.

Equip me with a zeal for righteousness.

Never let me grow accustomed or acclimated to

unrighteousness. Amen



A Dip into the past History of Farnworth Church.

Late March of this year, prior to the lockdown due to the Corona Virus Pandemic, Geoff Poole and I travelled to Hoghton Towers, Preston to see if Sir Henry Hoghton had a key to the crypt in Farnworth Church. This was in response to Geoff's research into the Bold Family and their connections to the Hoghton Family and how many of them were interred in the crypt. The Bold Family had long been benefactors of Farnworth Church and intermarried with some of the important families in the area.

Farnworth had a Chantry School but with the start of the Reformation Henry VIII in 1548 ordered Thomas Cromwell, his Vicar General to demolish all Chantries. Fortunately for Farnworth the Chantry was part of the Parish Church and was spared by exemption. After three hundred years disaster struck on Christmas Eve 1854 when a violent storm destroyed most of the roof of

the Chantry and the North Aisle.

Henry Hoghton of the New Bold Hall, son of Sir Henry Bold Hoghton, 8TH Baronet and Dorothea, nee Patten Bold, provided half of the cost of repairs which amounted to £1,120. He rebuilt the Bold Chapel and the Crypt in 1855. After his father died he became Sir Henry de Hoghton, 9th Baronet and is interred with his mother in the Crypt. Also in the Crypt are Princess Sapieha, his great aunt Anna Maria Bold and grandfather Peter Patten Bold.

The last time the Crypt was opened for inspection descendents of the Bold Family were present including the then vicar, Rev. F.T. Barnsley Webber. The church had to be sealed and permission obtained from the Bishop of Liverpool as it was a tomb. Unfortunately having taken a locksmith two days to open the doors it proved impossible to close it properly. It was in this condition when we looked at the possibility of inspecting it recently. It is our intention to secure and lock the doors to prevent any further intrusion.

On our visit to Hoghton Towers we invited Sir Bernard to come and view his Family Crypt which he was keen to do. Unfortunately due to the current restrictions this has proved impossible but will take place when restrictions are lifted.

If there is enough support we could arrange a trip to Hoghton Towers and have a guided tour to see for ourselves the connection to Farnworth Church when circumstances allow.

The tradition of Well Dressing





Well dressing is the art of decorating (dressing) wells, springs or other water sources with pictures and collages made of growing things. This ancient custom is popular all over Derbyshire and is thought to date back to the Celts or even earlier.

The wells are dressed with large framed panels decorated with elaborate mosaic-like pictures made of flower petals, seeds, grasses, leaves, tree bark, berries and moss. Wooden trays are covered with clay, mixed with water and salt; a design is drawn and its outline
