# Dear Friends,

As I sit to write 'Dear Friends' on an evening in early September, I am aware of the chill in the air and the wind whooshing about outside and although the leaves have yet to fully transform in colour, things are definitely beginning to change, the season of autumn is knocking on our doors.

Seasons are fundamental to how we understand the climate and the environment, but for hundreds of years academics have argued that their specialist field is the one which defines the official start of autumn. In meteorological terms autumn begins on 1<sup>st</sup> September, as each season is defined as a three-month period. Astronomers, however, base the date of the seasons upon celestial events, in this case the autumnal equinox, when night and day are roughly equal length, taking place on 21<sup>st</sup> September. Whilst the third definition of the start of autumn, comes from phenology – the study of periodic plant and animal life cycle events. But whichever way you look at it, autumn is really dictated, not by a set date or a single event, but the changes in the natural world, such as the tinting of the trees and the ripening of autumn fruits.

I love this season, the vibrant colours, oranges and reds of the leaves, the squirrels hunting for acorns, the opportunity to wrap up in snuggly jumpers and drink hot chocolate. The season of autumn also has a lot to offer us as Christians, it has several powerful metaphors for us, reflecting themes of spiritual maturity, letting go, death, and renewal.

#### Spiritual harvest and maturity

Autumn is traditionally the harvest season, a time for gathering crops that have matured over the summer. This directly parallels biblical teachings about spiritual harvest and maturity.

• A time of reaping: Just as farmers reap what they sow, Christians reap the results of their faithfulness. In Matthew 9:37-38, Jesus tells his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few," equating bringing people to salvation with the work of the harvest.

Bearing fruit: Paul's instruction in Galatians 6:7-9 for believers to

"sow seeds of faithfulness" in order to be "ripe for Christ's return" also speaks to this theme of spiritual maturity.

#### Letting go and surrender

The image of trees shedding their leaves in autumn is a potent metaphor for a Christian's need to let go of old habits, possessions, or even parts of their identity that hinder spiritual growth.

• **Trusting God:** The falling leaves demonstrate a natural process of release, and Christians are called to similarly surrender control and trust in God's plan.

**Preparing for new life:** This shedding isn't merely a loss; it's a necessary step to conserve energy and prepare for the new growth of spring. For a Christian, letting go prepares the heart for God's renewing work.

#### **Death and resurrection**

Autumn's inevitable transition towards winter's chill symbolises the concepts of death and the promise of resurrection.

• **Dying to self:** The beautiful, colourful decay of autumn leaves serves as a reminder that dying to our old, sinful selves can also be a beautiful part of our transformation into the image of Christ. **Hope of rebirth:** Although winter is coming, Christians hold the hope that death is not the end. Just as new life emerges in the spring, Jesus broke through death to offer eternal life. This reminds believers that their lives are joined to a new tree that winter cannot touch.

### God's consistent presence

The predictable cycle of the seasons, year after year, reminds Christians of God's unchanging nature and faithfulness.

• A dependable rhythm: Just as the seasons reliably follow one another, Christians can trust in God's promises through all the seasons of their own lives.

**Comfort in change:** Amidst the changes of life, the constancy of God provides a source of stability and comfort.

So as we navigate through this season looking towards winter and the important Christian celebrations of Advent and Christmas that lie ahead, take a minute to stop and reflect on the here and now, on the season of autumn and all it has to tell us about spiritual growth, surrendering the old to make way for new life, gathering the spiritual harvest, and trusting in God's faithful presence through this and all of life's seasons. **Clare.**

# Remembering VJ Day – 80 Years On at the National Memorial Arboretum

On Friday 15th August the Royal British Legion, in partnership with the Government, hosted the Commemorative Event at the National Memorial Arboretum to mark the 80th anniversary of VJ Day and the end of the Second World War.

Attended by Their Majesties The King and Queen, and over 30 VJ Day veterans. Paying tribute to all those who served in the Far East and the Pacific, a national Two-Minute Silence was held at midday, followed by a one-hour commemoration at the base of the Armed Forces Memorial. The commemoration featured 400 members of the Armed Forces and included musical performances, readings and veteran testimonies, as well as a flypast from the Red Arrows and historic aircraft from The Battle of Britain Memorial Flight.

### Café Worship at Cronton Mission Church August 2025

Even though it was summer we were busy at Cronton Mission Church in August, we had our usual Café Worship and we heard from Luke's Gospel focused on predicting the weather / weather warnings. I've always been interested in weather. The television weathermen or weather women sound pretty sure about their forecasts, but I know enough about meteorology to know that forecasting the weather is sometimes mostly a guess. If we don't like the weather, we can't call the Weather Channel and complain! Why? Because we don't make the weather-God does! The children made their own weather wheels whilst the adults thought about the importance of taking note of the spiritual climate. In the passage (Luke 12:54-56) Jesus talks about forecasting the weather. He comments that the Jews were pretty accurate in forecasting weather, but they weren't as good at observing the current spiritual conditions and interpreting the spiritual climate, the spiritual 'weather warnings' and we have the same problem today. If we received a weather warning about a severe storm I think / I hope we would pay attention, maybe we would alter our plans or batten down the hatches, and at the very least we might decide to take an umbrella out with us. And so, we must do the same when we hear Jesus' spiritual forecasts. In the Bible passage Jesus said to the crowd, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, immediately you say, 'It's going to rain,' and it does. And when the south wind blows, you say, 'It's going to be hot,' and it is. Hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of the earth and the sky. How is it that you don't know how to interpret this present time?" Although they were good at predicting the weather by observing the conditions, they were clueless about understanding God's spiritual climate. Here's the tragic mistake of Jesus' listeners. In fact, the Jews missed the signs of Christ's First Coming. For hundreds of years, God used prophets to predict the Messiah would come. He graciously gave hundreds of signs that the Jews could consult in order to identify the Messiah: but they missed the signs. God showed them hundreds of years in advance the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem; He would be born of a virgin, of the tribe of Judah. Daniel even prophesied the exact time when the Messiah would be born, that's why wise men from the East were looking for the birth of the King of the Jews-they were looking for the signs, but the Jews weren't.

John reports Jesus came unto His own (the Jews) and they didn't receive Him. When Jesus spoke these words, He knew the cross was only a few weeks away and the Jewish people were clueless about His identity and purpose. Just a few weeks after He spoke these words, Jesus would approach Jerusalem and weep over the city because they missed all these signs. In Luke 19:41, 44 we read: As he approached Jerusalem, he wept over it and said, "If you had only known on this day what would bring you peace ... but you did not recognise the time of God's coming to you." That was the tragedy. They didn't recognise the signs of the times; God was doing the greatest thing in history—and they missed it! But before we are too harsh on the Jews of 2,000 years ago, let me ask you this...

Are we any better now? How good are we at understanding the spiritual signs? Jesus said it is possible for us to understand the "sign of the times." And the best sign we have to understand the spiritual forecast is the Word of God – the Bible.

We have an advantage over the Jews in Jesus' day: we have the complete written revelation of God. There were over 300 Old Testament Scriptures predicting the first coming of Jesus. There are over 1,000 scriptures predicting the events of the Second Coming of Christ. The Bible isn't hard to understand once you have the key.

The key is all the Bible is about Jesus:

The Old Testament says: Someone is coming

The Gospels say: Someone has come, and His name is Jesus

The Epistles and Revelation tell us: Someone is coming again—get ready!

But there are plenty of other clues God has given us, too and we need to pay attention to these, to the winds of what is happening in our world today. The Bible says in the last days, perilous times will come. When you turn on the news all the stories seem to be about the various 'storms' of the world. There is an ill wind blowing and we should pay attention to the political and spiritual climate. But it is not all bad, the Bible also predicts in Joel and Acts that in the Last Days, God will pour out His Spirit our sons and daughters

the Last Days, God will pour out His Spirit our sons and daughters will proclaim God's Word, young men will see visions and old men will dream dreams!

#### Café Worship at Cronton Mission Church July 2025

At our café worship service in July, we heard the Bible story of Jesus' visit to the home of Mary and Martha and how Mary sat at Jesus' feet and listened to Jesus whilst Martha bustled about getting a meal ready. Martha complained to Jesus and requested that Mary help her, but Jesus highlighted that Mary had chosen the right option.

It is a familiar story to many of us but one that is often hard for us to put into action. In our busy daily lives taking time out to focus on Jesus and growing our faith can often feel difficult, so many competing priorities: our work lives / our family commitments / time with friends etc.

The children made paper plate clocks to take home with them, to remind them about the importance of making time for Jesus each day and the adults were introduced to 'The Rule of Life'. This is not a new initiative, but it is one that is being championed by the Liverpool Diocese. 'The Rule of Life' is a framework of practices and habits designed to help a person grow in their spiritual journey, often by deepening their relationship with God and becoming more like Christ, rather than a strict set of rigid rules. Like a trellis supports a vine, it provides structure and direction for daily rhythms, helping to bring balance, focus, and intentionality to how one lives out their commitments and faith in the world.

The Liverpool Diocese summarises the Rule of Life based around six words:

We are <u>called</u> to **Pray**, **Read** and **Learn** AND <u>sent</u> to **Tell**, **Serve** and **Give**.

You might find it helpful in writing a Rule of Life for yourselves, to support you growing in faith and strengthening your relationship with God.



# Writing a Rule of Life - one approach Personal Rule Assessment

- Take a sheet of paper and make a line down the middle. Make a line across about two-thirds of the way down.
- Label the top left rectangle *Daily*, and the top right rectangle *Weekly*. The bottom left rectangle is labelled *Monthly*, and the bottom right *Annually*.
- In the *Daily* box write in any spiritual practice you do daily (e.g. Bible reading). Follow suit with each of the following boxes. You will certainly have Sunday worship in the *Weekly* box. If you do something three times a week, write it in the *Weekly* box and put "3X" behind it. Something you do twice a month, would be in the *Monthly* box with "2X" behind it. Stretch your imagination. You can always edit this later. Just because things are routine doesn't mean they're not important. The *Yearly* box might have things like annual retreat or Covenant Service in it. What you've got on your sheet is your rule as it currently exists.

#### **Expanding Your Rule**

- If you yearn to do more, then it's time to look around for what will work for you. This is an interesting and exciting process, but it takes time.
- Start by going back to the personal assessment sheet you made up. See how balanced your spiritual life is by coding each item according to the code below. Some items will have more than one category.
  - E = Education (personal bible study, house group etc.
  - L = Liturgical participation (Reader, deacon, eucharistic minister, preacher etc.)
  - S = Service (committee work, volunteer work, newsletter, pastoral care team, etc.)
  - W = Worship
- If there are gaps that you wish to try and fill without overburdening yourself then add something in that you are going to try perhaps for the first time or after a gap of several months or years. Use a different coloured pen or pencil for these.

Be patient with yourself and remember that this is not an athletic contest. True progress will only happen with God's grace, and that will be given to you in his time, not yours. It's important that you feel comfortable with what you add on

Go slowly. Your chances of success are better if you add one or two things at a time, learn to live with them and fully integrate them into your life. Adding too much at once can be overwhelming and burn you out. Think in terms of making it for the long haul.


The school has asked if anyone could help by donating the following items:

ALL SOULS SERVICE 'A time to remember' Sunday, November 2<sup>nd</sup> 3pm.




This is intentionally a very gentle service. The names of those from our Parish who have died during the past twelve months and have had services in our church or at the Crematorium Chapel will be read out.

At the time of writing this report, we have heard from the Diocese Board of Finance that they have agreed to offset our outstanding Parish share up to the end of December 2024 against the rents received by them from Bold Mission up to September 2022, when the initial lease ended. We are still in discussion with them regarding the remaining rents from September 2022 to end of June 2024.

As I stated in my last report, we are now receiving rent from Bold Mission direct from the management agency rather than the Diocese, however as it is only £4,400 per quarter, it will only cover three months parish share in a year. Going forward we will have to be able to pay £6254 in full every month, which at the moment is impossible. If we can't do this then the church will be at risk of closing. I can't stress this enough.

Please support our fundraising activities and review your donations to the church. Some of the regular donors haven't increased their giving in the last 10 years. There is very little in cash on the plate each service too.

We need your support more than ever, to cover the general fund overheads, which are around £10,000 per month. Spread the word please, that help is required

### Cronton mission and school

Cronton Mission as part of Farnworth Parish and St Lukes PCC has significant decisions to make regarding its future. We have been asked to consider "Fit for Mission" – a Liverpool Diocese initiative which will bring together the parishes in Widnes Deanery under one big umbrella.

Whilst recognising the need for change to ensure our churches remain financially viable, and more importantly, serving the needs of our worshiping congregations and wider communities, there are anxieties about retaining local decision making by people who understand our churches and local people.

At Cronton Mission, we have always strived to be forward thinking and embrace change, but ask for your prayers at this time to ask God to lead and drive our decisions, so that they are the right ones for generations to come.









At the end of the last academic year, we held a Holy communion service of thanksgiving at Cronton Mission, led by Reverend Peter and Clare, for the work of Sylvia Thomson, who has taken partial retirement and left her role as headteacher. This service brought together St Lukes and Cronton Mission alongside Sylvia and her family, school families (past and present), and retired governors and clergy. We thanked Sylvia for the commitment and drive she has given to Cronton school and its community for 18 years, leading the school to achieve 2 consistent Outstanding Ofsted ratings and seamlessly embedded our distinctly Christian vision and values throughout. We asked for God's blessing to support Sylvia in her new venture. Sylvia received gifts from both Cronton and St Lukes – Clare had produced a piece of artwork encompassing the stained-glass window at Cronton and involving members of our worshiping communities who added their fingerprints. Shared refreshments and fellowship ended our worship.

The autumn term has started well with Julie Roberts as interim headteacher and Amy Durr/Matthew Tunstall as interim assistant heads. The children have settled well in their new classes along with 2 additional temporary teachers. Work is underway alongside LDST to recruit a new headteacher, which will then establish leadership arrangements going forwards. We pray that the right person sees our advert and is driven to visit the school to reflect on the contribution they can make to the provision of an outstanding Christian education for our children, and in leading our school through the local, national and world challenges we face.

We had fun making our own sheep masks, colouring in and sticking on cotton wool, before playing a game looking round church to find the sheep that were lost and needed to be found. Clare










### **MOTHERS' UNION**
